### President's Message

*Dear Rev.Fathers, Brothers and Alumni Friends*

I am happy to convey my fraternal greetings on the occasion of the release of first e-news letter "Voice of JAAI" for the term 2020-2023 of Jesuit Alumni Associations of India (JAAI). I greatly appreciate the efforts of Prof.Edmund Frank, the editor of JAAI news letter in bringing it to us as a reality.

COVID 19 pandemic has had a great impact on the day today life of mankind and by the grace of God ,efforts of the Government, the medical fraternity , the health workers volunteers, lot of relief work have been carried out to prevent the spread of this pandemic. Many of our Jesuit Institutions and alumni associations have carried out wonderful COVID relief work providing beds, pillows, blankets, food rations, provisions, oximeters, face masks etc. Many of our alumni associations have taken novel methods of providing relief for the relief against COVID pandemic. Further Jesuit Relief Hub(JRH) which is a part of the Jesuit Conference of South Asia (JCSA) has been also working in close conjunction with the beneficiaries in providing relief work especially for migrant workers. It is also planning to bring out more relief programs for the migrants especially in providing the migrants with the local work of the State of origin and trying to help them with reverse migration to get back to their work for livelihood. I am thankful to JRH for Co-opting me in the capacity of President of JAAI. Rev.Fr.George Pattery and the JRH also highlighted the need for the alumni support in helping to create a data base of the migrants which could be used by JRH and the alumni associations in

providing relief work for the migrants when they reach their states of origin. JRH is also planning to launch a multilingual helpline similar to that of child helpline and also manning 24 x 7 multilingual helpdesk for providing relief for the migrants. Further JAAI is also proposing launch webinars on subjects of career guidance and topics of general popularity like in increasing the skills in communication, counselling etc.

I am happy that in spite of the lock down many of our Jesuit Educational Institutions and alumni associations have risen above board in providing relief.

The first JAAI GC meeting was held on 17th May,2020 through Zoom conference call on a marathon 4 hours duration where many of our GC Members and PCA's participated. I am also thankful to Rev.Fr.George Pattery SJ-Provincial for south Asia (POSA) for gracing the occasion and Rev.Fr.Sunny Jacob, National Advisor for his advice and counsel. I wish our alumni associations and alumni, Rev.Fathers, Rev.Brothers, teachers, students all glory and salute them for their yeomen services in being the torch bearers in imparting their knowledge through teaching and mentoring.Let us follow the tenets of Ignatian spiritby following the Universal Apostolic Preferences(UAP).I have great pleasure in wishing you all a very a happy feast of St.Ignatius of Loyola which will on 31st July,2020.

He will animate crucial Jesuit works such as the Jesuit Refugee Service in India, Nepal, Sri Lanka, Pakistan and Bangladesh. Fr. Stany has a good reputation as a very able administrator. ### X Congress World Union Jesuit Alumni Barcelona 2021

Barcelona in the upcoming year, for a few days will become the world meeting point of the Ignatian community. After these days of confinement, reflection and solidarity we want to share with you alumni, teachers, members and friends of the Ignatian community, a message: **"United by values, moved by the future"**.

Barcelona 2021 comes as a process of reflection and dialogue around the value and actions that the Jesuit Alumni we have in front of us. Our common objective is to revive the potential of our network and to respond to the challenges of today's society, inviting everyone to participate in a live reconciliation and jointly promote the value of union and action among alumni, all over the world and especially young people.

**The X World Union Jesuit Alumni Congress to be held on 14th-18th July 2021 in Barcelona will be part of the acts to commemorate the 5th Centenary of the conversion of Saint Ignatius 500**, which will be held in Spain that "Ignatius year 2021-2022".

On our behalf, in order to commemorate the 5th Centenary in a meaningful way, we invite everybody on the dawn of July 13, to precede the Congress with a pilgrimage from Montserrat to La Cova in Manresa, after a **"shared night candle"** the previous evening in the Montserrat basilica and in the church of Casp Jesuit Barcelona school. It will be a moment of encounter with ourselves and with other alumni from all over the world, **to jointly follow the steps of the path that Saint Ignatius traveled 500 years ago**.

The following day, Father General Arturo Sosa, s.j, will lead us the opening of the Congress showing his reflection on the challenges and actions as alumni we have to conquer, in the Ignatian framework of Reconciliation and the guidelines of the Universal Apostolic Preferences of the Society of Jesus. Main challenges that the Society is facing today and elements of aid for our action and its transformation will be worked on, combining the knowledge and experiences of relevant speakers, with the debate and interaction of congress participants in co-creation workshops.

#### These are the main challenges and problems that the humanity is facing today, on what we want to discuss:

- Ecology and our common House
- The problem of migration and the opportunity that arises
- The role of women in society and in the church
- Technology at the service of people
- The potential of religions in reconciliation
- Social innovation as a tool for social transformation

#### and these, the elements and tools for our action and its transformation:

- Education, a transforming element of society

## REV. FR. ADOLFO NICHOLAS SJ (Former Superior General of the Society of Jesus) is no more

### A Tribute by Jesuit Superior General Rev. Arturo Sosa SJ

Dear Brothers,

With sorrow, but at the same time full of gratitude, I wish to inform you that today, May 20th, in Tokyo, the Lord called to Himself Father Adolfo Nicolás, our former Superior General. Father Nicolás, affectionately called “Adolfo” by many of us and “Nico” by the Jesuits of Asia Pacific, was born in Palencia (Spain) on 29 April 1936. He entered the Society on 14 September 1953 and was ordained a priest on 17 March 1967. As a scholastic he was sent to the mission of Japan, where, among other things, he was professor of theology, rector of scholastics and provincial, later dedicating himself to social work with immigrants in Tokyo. For ten years he lived in the Philippines, serving as director of the East Asia Pastoral Institute (EAPI) and as president of the Conference of Provincials of East Asia and Oceania. After presenting his resignation as General of the Society, he was a spiritual director at EAPI and in the Arrupe International Residence in Manila.

Father Nicolás was elected Superior General by the 35th General Congregation on 19 January 2008. Eight years later, on 3 October 2016, General Congregation 36 accepted his resignation. On that occasion, representing the members of the Congregation and in the name of the Society, Father Federico Lombardi addressed Father Nicolás with heartfelt words of gratitude for his generous service as Superior General. I invite you to reread that tribute, included among the documents of GC 36. It captures in exemplary fashion the personal style with which Father Nicolás exercised authority -- always full of warmth, goodness, and joy -as well as his innumerable contributions, as Superior General, to the progress of the Society and of the Church. As Father Lombardi said, we will never forget two words that Father Nicolás repeated constantly and that inspired us in the renewal of the Society: “universality” (of our vocation and our mission) and “depth” (spiritual and intellectual, for the sake of our mission). The best way to remember Father Adolfo Nicolás may be with a brief prayer, written in his own hand in Italian after an eight-day retreat with his General Council in 2011,

Exercises that I had the privilege to accompany. Many months after those Exercises, some meetings of the Council began with this prayer, which arose from the personal meditation of Father Nicolás on the miraculous catch of fish narrated by Saint John in chapter 21. It is an excellent synthesis of his person and of his spirituality. The original version of the prayer is this: Lord Jesus, What weaknesses did you see in us that made you decide to call us, in spite of everything, to collaborate in your mission?

We give you thanks for having called us, and we beg you not to forget your promise to be with us to the end of time.

Frequently we are invaded by the feeling of having worked all night in vain, forgetting, perhaps, that you are with us.

We ask that you make yourself present in our lives and in our work, today, tomorrow, and in the future yet to come.

Fill with your love these lives of ours, which we put at your service. Take from our hearts the egoism of thinking about what is “ours,” what is “mine”, always excluding, lacking compassion and joy. Enlighten our minds and our hearts, and do not forget to make us smile when things do not go as we wished.

At the end of the day, of each one of our days, make us feel more united with you and better able to perceive and discover around us greater joy and greater hope.

We ask all this from our reality. We are weak and sinful men, but we are your friends. Amen.





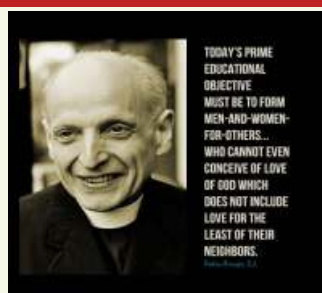

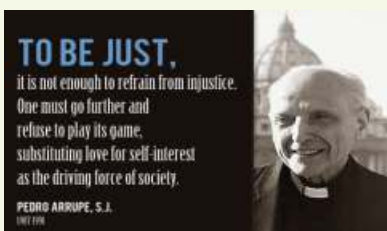

## Cause for the Canonisation of Fr. Pedro Arrupe SJ 28th Superior General of the Society of Jesus

Cause for the Canonisation of Fr. Pedro Arrupe SJ the 28th Superior General of the Society of Jesus, officially opened in Rome on 5 February 2019 which was also his 28th anniversary of



death. Born in Spain in 1907 Fr. Arrupe entered the Jesuits in 1927 after completing his medical education. He was ordained in 1936. When he joined the Society of Jesus, he always asked to go on the missions and finally was sent to Japan to work as a missionary. Between the parentheses, Pope Francis also wanted to go Japan, but Fr. Arrupe told him his lungs weren't good enough so he's better stay in Argentina. Pope Francis and Fr. Arrupe met several times later on. He was in Rome in 1974 for the 32 nd General Congregation of the Jesuits. He was 38, so rather young and he had already been appointed provincial by Fr Arrupe in Argentina which means Fr. Arrupe had confidence in him. Shortly after coming to Rome as Pope, he went to the Church of the Jesu where Fr. Arrupe is buried. He offered flowers at Fr. Arrupe's tomb and prayed in silence. This was very significant. In many ways we see Francis as a Pope is a reflection of of Fr. Arrupe's influence. Fr. Arrupe

witnessed the bombings of Hiroshima and Nagasaki in Japan. He served as Superior General of the Jesuits from 1965 to 1983. He led the Jesuits through the end of the Second Vatican Council and its early implementation and died on 5 February 1991. His famous 1973 address to Jesuit educators and students "Men and women for others ." has become a central guiding document for Jesuit education. Men and women for others " are persons who cannot conceive of love of God without love of neighbor. Theirs is an efficacious love that has justice as its first requirement." His commitment to Justice led him to establish the Jesuit Refugee Service which serves refugees and other forcibly displaced persons in 52 countries today. Fr. Arrupe had a great sense of humour. Some eager American Jesuits were passing through Rome on their way to India. Fr. Arrupe asked Vincent O'Keef SJ, what they were doing. "Going to India to learn about the poor," Fr. Vincent replied. Fr. Arrupe quipped in reply, " It certainly takes a lot of money to teach our men about poverty. "

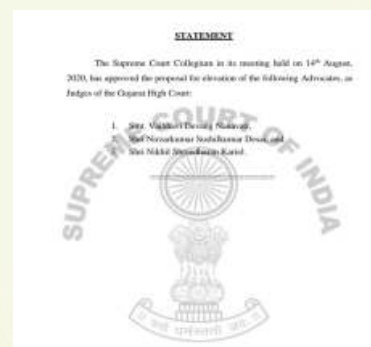

## Condolences to an eminent alumnus

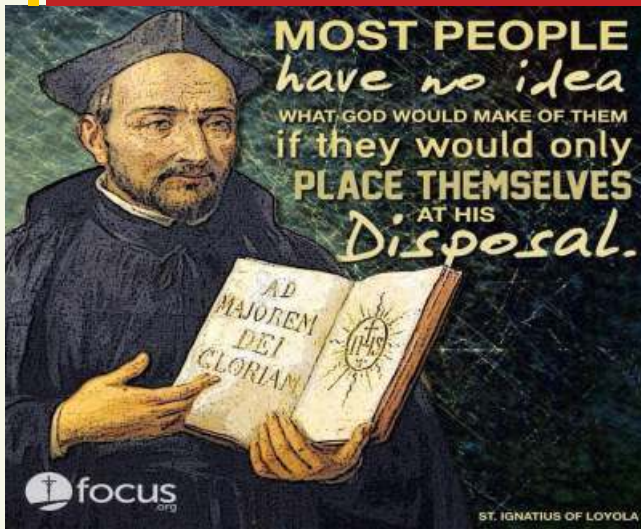

## St. Ignatius of Loyola - A brief life sketch

St. Ignatius of Loyola, the founder of the Society of Jesus (23 October 1491 to 31 July 1556) was on his way to military fame and fortune when a cannonball shattered his leg. Since there were no books on fiction and romance at hand during his convalescence, Ignatius whiled away the time reading books on the life of Christ and saints. His conscience was deeply touched when he read the life story of Jesus Christ and a long, painful turning to Christ began. Having seen the Mother of God in a vision, he made a pilgrimage to her shrine Manresa near Barcelona at Montserrat near Barcelona. He remained for almost a year at nearby Manresa, sometimes with the Dominicans, sometimes in a pauper's hospice and often in a cave in the hills, praying. After a period of great penance and prayer he went through a harrowing trial of scruples. There was no comfort in anything—prayer, fasting, sacraments and penance. At length he experienced peace of mind.

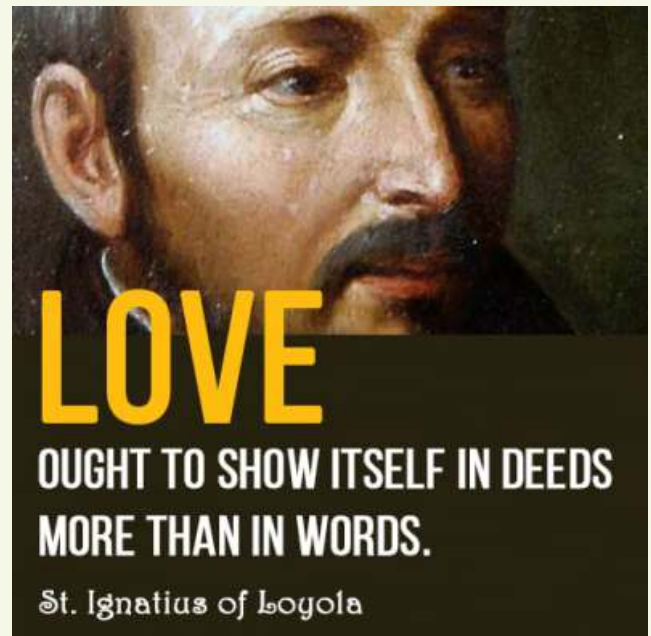
It was during this year of conversion that Ignatius began to write down material that later became his greatest work, the Spiritual Exercises.

He finally achieved his purpose of going to the Holy Land, but could not remain, as he planned because of the hostility of the Turks. Ignatius spent the next 11 years in various European Universities, studying with great difficulty, beginning almost as a child. Like many others, his orthodoxy was questioned; Ignatius was twice jailed for brief periods.

In 1534, at the age of 43, he and 6 others—one of whom was St. Francis Xavier—vowed to live in

poverty and chastity and to go to the Holy Land. If this became impossible they vowed to offer themselves to the apostolic service of the Pope. The latter became the only choice. Four years later Ignatius made the association permanent. The new Society of Jesus was approved by Pope Paul III, and Ignatius was elected to serve as the first General.

When companions were sent on various missions by the pope, Ignatius remained in Rome, consolidating the new venture, but still finding time to found homes for orphans, catechumens



and penitents. He founded the Roman College, intended to be the model of all other colleges of the Society.

Ignatius was a true mystic. He centered his spiritual life on the essential foundations of Christianity—the Trinity, Christ, the Eucharist. His spirituality is expressed in the Jesuit motto, *ad maiorem Dei Gloriam*—"for the greater glory of God". In his concept, obedience was to be the prominent virtue, to assure the effectiveness and mobility of his men. All activity was to be guided by a true love of the Church and unconditional obedience to the Holy Father, for which reason all professed members took a fourth vow to go wherever the Pope should send them for the salvation of souls.

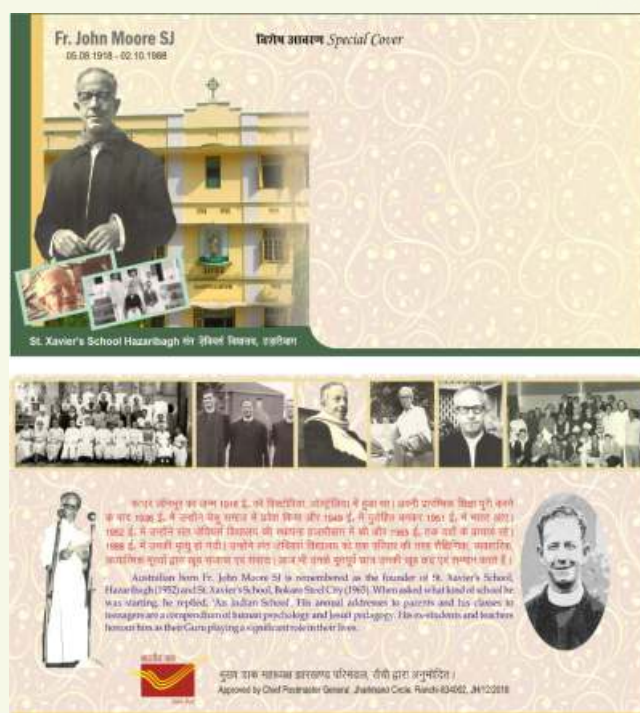

## Report on Jesuit Alumni activities during COVID-19 pandemic - Neel Mani Rangesh, Secretary, JAAI



The COVID-19 pandemic marks an unprecedented time in modern history that will require the best of humanity to overcome. The world is grappling with possibly the worst public health crisis seen in more than a century. The new coronavirus has taken thousands of lives and spread to nearly every country in the world. The COVID-19 pandemic has gripped nations, compelling governments to impose countrywide lockdowns to contain the spread of the deadly virus. This crisis threatens everyone's way of life, but it is especially difficult for people who are already vulnerable, including those with pre-existing medical conditions, older adults, individuals experiencing homelessness, refugees and migrants, wage workers, and those with inflexible jobs. Jesuit Alumni Associations of India (JAAI) believes that Jesuit Alumni/ae deeply rooted in local communities are best positioned to lead and give the communities on the front lines of the crisis the resources they need to act quickly and protect the most vulnerable such as helping in delivering essential items to struggling families and individuals quarantined, arrange doctor, health care persons and other front line responders to communities in need, support hygiene awareness efforts and much, much more.

Many Jesuits and Jesuit Alumni Associations are working in coordination with local administration and providing critical medical support and meeting critical needs of communities around the country. Jesuit Alumni/ae are making efforts and living by the JAAI motto "to give and not to count the cost". Although it will be very difficult to compile all the activities, but I have tried to include activities which have come to our knowledge through social media or other sources. I am very much sure that many services to humanity done by Jesuits and Jesuit Alumni/ae may have been so pure service and goodwill that they could not reach us and thus may not be included here. I sincerely apologize for non-inclusion of any such activities inadvertently. In the next issue of the report, we will surely try to include all such activities. The major activities in response to COVID-19 pandemic and critical situation of lockdown by the Jesuits and Jesuits Alumni Associations are as follows:

### 1. Association of Past Xavierites (APX), Ahmedabad and Members connected to St. Xavier High School, Loyola, Ahmedabad

They formed a small groups and prepared food packets and distributed 10,000 food packets to the needy per day under the direction of Mr Vijay Nehra (IAS), Municipal commissioner of Ahmedabad. An APX, task force was formed by the Municipal Commissioner and was given the responsibility of tapping resources for bedsheets, pillows, beds, plates, spoons etc.



1000 beds, 1000 mattresses and 1000 sets each of plate, spoon, bowl & glass, 1000 pillows, 1000 bed sheets, 1000 pillow

covers, 1150 tooth brushes, 1150 tooth pastes, 1000 bathing soaps, 1040 hand wash, 1000 packets of paper napkins were supplied



at Tapi facility, Nikol and 675 beds, 1080 mattresses, 1000 sets each of plate, spoon, bowl and glass, 1000 pillows, 1080 bed

sheets, 1080 pillow covers, 1152 tooth brushes, 1152 toothpastes, 1000 bathing soaps, 1080 hand wash liquid soap





bottles, 1000 packets of paper napkin and 45,000 food packets were supplied at Gota, Ahmedabad facility till 9 April 2020. With the help of Police, they have distributed milk, bread and Parle-G biscuits to the needy people of Khatraj and surrounding villages and outskirts of the city of Ahmedabad. They have already raised around Rs 1.60 Crores and as need arises; they are ready to raise more.

## 2. Loyola Alumni Association (LAA), Jamshedpur

Loyola Alumni Association (LAA), Jamshedpur supported the needy people who were severely effected. This was



a joint effort of Loyola and XLRI and was executed over a period of 6 weeks. With the help of the Adarsh Seva Sansthan, an NGO they

identified 1100 families in the BPL category. They distributed each day for 6 weeks food packets consisting of rice, dall, oil, biscuits etc through Adarsh Seva Sansthan and their team of Volunteers. XLRI team procured and



packed the material while LAA team transported the packets from XLRI to Adarsh Seva Sansthan in Sonari.

**3. Old Boys' Association, Loyola School (LOBA), Trivandrum** – was selected by the Kerala State government as a Corona Care Center (CCC) Each Corona Care Center is a 24-hour facility manned by 50 people across 10 roles. The center is headed by a person appointed by the State Government Old Boys' Association, Loyola School, Trivandrum (LOBA), his been tasked with planning,

setting up and running a Corona Care Center (CCC) at Loyola School, Sreekaryam, Trivandrum.



## 4. St. Xavier's College and St. Xavier's College Calcutta Alumni Association (SXCAA), Kolkata



Jesuit Priests of St. Xavier's, Kolkata and the Xaverians donated Rs. 40 Lakhs to the West Bengal CM's Relief Fund to fight against COVID-19.

On the holy day of Good Friday, SXCAA under the leadership of its President and Principal of the College Rev. Fr. Dominic Savio SJ and other Jesuits of the college distributed food packets to the needy local people with the assistance from Kolkata Police.

## 5. Doranda Old Xavierans (DOX), Ranchi

DOX has partnered with their alma-mater in supporting three shelter homes run by St. Xavier's, Doranda and District Administration and sponsored food for 50 families of the outreach students of the school for a month. They raised Rupees 2,28,000 for the Project in less than 24 hrs. They supplied grocery kits for a month for 49 families of school's outreach students and 38 families of non-teaching staffs of the school. They have also supplied rice, dal & potatoes to 20 families at C.F. Andrews Memorial English School, Tharpakhna, Ranchi with the







help of local authorities. They are continuously supplying food provisions, bed sheets, pillow covers, etc. for the shelter homes. Stress Bursting messages are also

being circulated in alumni group to get one motivated during the critical situation of lock down.



#### 6. Bokaro Old Xaverian Association (BOXA), Bokaro



Food Bags were distributed to families of mishra colony, sector-1 and villages in Bokaro under the supervision

of local administration led by CO & BDO of the area. The St. Xavier's School, Bokaro is the Nodal Centre for planning, packing and distribution of food bags. They are also provided masks, gloves and caps.



#### 7. Andhra Loyola College Alumni Association (ALCAA), Vijawada, Andhra Pradesh

They collected donations for free distribution of food and water for poor and the needy people and migrants. They also distributed thousands of eggs per day to police colonies in Vijaywad and Guntur. The



college campus has been given to poor farmers for selling vegetables and auditorium is being used by the Police to lodge quarantine victims.

#### 8. Loyola Public School Alumni (LPSA), Guntur

Alumni of Loyola Public School, Guntur along

with non-teaching and teaching staffs of the school carried out food distribution to needy homeless people on streets



of Guntur and all neighbouring villages around. One of its alumni, Aluri Inder Kumar (1976-1977 Batch), who is the CEO of Avanthi Feeds, has personally donated an amount of Rs. 1 Crore to Andhra Pradesh Chief Minister Relief Fund.

#### 9. St. Michael's Alumni Association, Patna



St. Michael's Alumni Association, Patna distributed food and essential items on daily basis starting from 5 April 2020 to the poor people living behind St. Michael's High School, Patna, Makhdumpur locality, Bind toli and other localities of Digha area of Patna with direct involvement of Digha Police personnel.

#### 10. St. Xavier's Alumni Association (SXAA), Patna

St. Xavier's Alumni Association, Patna is contributed Rs. 1 Lakh to the Chief Minister Relief Fund, Bihar in a gesture of solidarity with fight against COVID-19. SXAA Vice-President Dr. Amulya Kr. Singh has personally



donated an amount of Rs. 1 Lakh to PM Cares Fund on 30 March 2020 and Rs. 51,000/- to Chief Minister Relief Fund, Bihar.





Alumni of 2006 batch prepared and distributed food on a daily basis to destitute families. Patna Jesuit Society has also distributed cooked meals to members of Mahadalit community in the slums of Rupaspur, Khagaul, Shahpur and Naubatpur areas of Patna.

#### 11. Loyola Ex-Students Association (LESA), Margaon

LESA committee member Ryan Vaz has developed a hard face mask and given them free of cost to help frontline brave medical brethren at ESI Hospital. They have also distributed perishable and non-perishable items to underprivileged senior citizens and others who have no means to get the essentials or too poor to purchase. They are also providing food for homeless daily. 1996 batch alone contributed Rs. 62,000/- towards provision of food for homeless and 150 biryani packets were distributed to people stranded at Navelim, Goa on 7 April 2020.

#### 12. The Ex Xavierites Alumni Association of Surat (TEXAS), Surat



The Ex Xavierites Alumni Association of Surat (TEXAS), Surat collected around 808 kits of essential items

with the help of its members, fathers, sisters and PTA and distributed to needy people with help of Navsaran organization. Another set of 220 kits were distributed on 19 April 2020.



#### 13. Darjeeling Jesuits of North Bengal

St. Joseph's School & College, North Point, Darjeeling and Xavier Educational Society of North Bengal sent and distributed the load of essential materials such

#### 14. St. John's Jesuit Community, Tamar, Ranchi

Ranchi Jesuit Society under the umbrella of Ranchi Archdiocese are running two shelter homes—one at

St. John's School, Dorea, Tamar shelter home is taking care of 200 men & 200 women migrants mostly coming from Uttar Pradesh & Bihar and few locals as well. All the essential things, food provisions etc. are being providing to them with the support from Jesuit Institutions such as XISS, St. Xavier's, Doranda and sisters from Samlong, Ranchi.

#### 15. Mangalore Jesuits Educational Society (MJES) and St. Aloysius Primary and High School, Mangaluru

St. Aloysius Primary and High School, Mangaluru distributed food grains and essential items worth Rs. 20 Lakhs to hundreds of destitute



families to help them to cope up with the lockdown period. Many families of Kannada



medium students studying in St. Aloysius High Primary and High School and even families of other more impoverished students benefitted from

this move. St Aloysius College Alumni association (SACAA) M V Nair and Prof. Edmund Frank and an alumni of St. Aloysius College, Mangaluru and JAAI GC member from Karnataka province have personally donated an amount of Rs. One Lakh each to St. Aloysius management to feed the needy.



## 16. Jaipur Xavier Educational Association and St. Xavier's School, Jaipur

tribal group mostly staying in their hamlets in private clusters away from the civilized society and other needy people. Masks which are being made in school are also being distributed free.

## 20. St. Stanislaus School, Bandra, Mumbai

St. Stanislaus School, Bandra, Mumbai has started a



migrant relief camp in the school campus for 100 men and 25 women in coordination with the Bombay Municipal Corporation (BMC). The campus was sanitized and bedding, toilet kits and material for cooking is being supplied by BMC and a team of doctors from Bhabha Hospital checks migrants on daily basis.



Vaishali Janarthan an alumna of St. Xavier's College Mumbai has been working with her team on feeding migrant and power loom workers in Bhiwandi, since 1 April 2020, a city 20 Kms from Mumbai.

He began by saying, "I am happy to connect with you today personally through webcam on this great occasion." Then his attention flew towards WUJA 2013 hosted in Columbia, city of Medellin and he had high praise for his predecessor who was then in charge. He said, "Fr. Adolfo Nicolas spoke very well at the last WUJA on Social Responsibility which was the theme of WUJA 2013 Congress. The theme at this 9 WUJA Congress is "Finding God on the Frontiers". "God is always challenging us to leave our comfort zones and go to the uncomfortable zones, to the Frontiers of the world where God's love finds resistance and where no one else would dare to go. Pedro Arrupe was very enthusiastic about the alumni possibilities to create that phrase 'forming men and women for others'. We are invited to work to be witnesses of God's love in the present day world which is full of greed, hatred, violence and exploitation.

I request WUJA to join hands with the Jesuits to make this place a better place to live in for all. We must work together to create better citizens to work for common good. To produce good men and

women we have to work for the transformation of the society because a good citizen can emerge only from a good society. Think of all the millions of people on the move looking for a better life because because the world's political, social and economic systems have failed them miserably. He briefly but clearly outlined the problems and challenges facing the world today as : 1. war and conflicts, 2. globalization, 3. ecological crisis, 4. information and technology revolution and 5. violence from religious fundamentalists that has created fear and insecurity everywhere he also revisited the expression the audacity of the improbable and the impossible a theme that inspired the general congregation of 2016 during which he was elected as the Jesuit superior General.

We need to look at the world from the eyes of all those people who are suffering as a result of these menacing problems and disasters and understand well what we can do to lighten their suffering. We need to build bridges that touch all corners of the world and open new possibilities to collaborate and cooperate at all levels. Our





endeavour was to build structures that would support the marginalized communities and help them to rise to a reasonable standard of living. At the same time we seek to form the conscience of individuals and and promote a culture of fraternity and acceptance. The General said that through the enormous network of Jesuit institutions and the alumni, we should take care of the global challenges that affect our local conditions. It was in this context the General said the words of Fr. Arrupe to form men and women for others became very relevant.

The Jesuit schools and colleges Fr. Arturo said were centers for preparing young people for the future, to give meaning to their lives and to train them to contribute to the common good of the society and planet earth. The task of the educator particularly in Jesuit educational institutions was to help the younger generation to make the world a better place to find their place in the world and before God. He urged Jesuit educators not merely to teach but to be educators and be a step ahead of the others. The duty of the educators was also to guide the youth to project their social and personal development to help them to build a better world.

The purpose of education, stressed Fr. Arturo was to train students to be men and women of conscience, competence, compassion and commitment. For the educators, their mission of teaching was an intellectual apostolate which needed a thorough understanding of the world to offer the greatest and the best service to the greater glory of God. The intellectual apostolate has been central to the mission of the Society of Jesus today, as it has been formed since its inception. Fr. Arturo stressed , ``The Jesuits are called to face the challenges of today`s world and

contribute towards reconciliation. The top priority for the Jesuits therefore at this moment in history is to work for the reconciliation in the world. This is a great challenge because we have to strive for 1. Reconciliation between humans and among humans, 2. Reconciliation with nature which was between man and God`s creation and 3. Reconciliation with God, which was between God and man. The kingdom of God, cannot be present and cannot exist among us if we do not understand each other, if we do not recognize each other as people and if we do not try to have a situation in which the world can live in peace.. He said Jesuits are called to trust in Jesus and seek not only the improbable but also the impossible, because nothing is impossible for God. But to achieve the impossible, one needs faith, because without it one can do nothing.

Following the talk, there was a thirty minute inter action between the attendees and the General. Fr. Arturo Sosa is a man with a sharp intellect, a sense of profound practical humility and a healthy sense of humour and has an open affection for people. No doubt, he has sparked a renewed vigour among the Jesuits and their collaborators in the countries he has visited as Superior General. In each country along with the Jesuits he has met their collaborators, learning from them about their context and giving them much food for thought with his reflections on the world today His visits have an inspiring impact on the Jesuits and the collaborator partners he meets. Soon on taking office as General, he showed eagerness to learn about the life of the Jesuits in the Society of Jesus in the continents and countries he has visited and has a clear message for every audience he addresses.

On day 3 of the Congress, 19 January 2020 the new Governing Council of JAAI for the term 2020-2023 were elected unanimously. President -CA. S. Chenthil Kumar Secretary -Mr. Neel Mani Rangesh Treasurer -Ravin Roy Later in the day the out going GC Office Bearers and members for the term 2017 -2020 were felicitated and the new Office Bearers for 2020-2023 were installed. The outgoing President Dr. Devendra Singh presented the new GC members to the Congress. Mr. CA S. Chenthil Kumar delivered the acceptance speech. He thanked everyone present for their contributions and participation and for making the 9th JAAI National Congress very successful. The Congress was inaugurated by the Chief Guest Rev. George Pottery SJ, the Provincial of South Asia. Mr. Alain Deneef, the President of the World Union of Jesuit Alumni was the Guest of Honour. Prof. John Verghese, Principal St. Stephan's College, Delhi delivered the keynote address.
